At the round table, each author will present a five- to seven-minute thesis summary of the longer paper, followed by comments by the respondent, Sandy Petrey. Open discussion will then take place for the remainder of the session (approximately fifty minutes).

LOCATION

The program will be held at The Penn State Conference Center Hotel. 
